President's Report

2018 will be recorded as a year of significant change for the South Australian Cystic Fibrosis (CF) community, at both the national and state level.

Nationally we continued to campaign passionately for access to *Orkambi* and were thrilled when this was listed on the PBS in October 2018. This means that up to 60% of our members can now access medications that treat their underlying CF defect. The national advocacy did not stop here though, with the approval process for the next medication, *Symdeko*, starting late last year. I hope that next year's President's report will have positive news as more medications become available in Australia.

CFSA's role in advocating for improved services for people with CF, is a very important one, involving support from the Board, Executive Officer, CFSA staff and members, key staff at both the Women's and Children's Hospital (WCH) and the Royal Adelaide Hospital (RAH) and SA Health. Last year CFSA had success with advocacy on important health issues affecting people with CF. Examples of improved services include:

- Relocation of the CF and Transplant Clinics to the RAH. This took more time than anticipated, well over 12 months, but with a wonderful team effort, we did achieve our goal. We continue to advocate for the involvement of the CF community in current and future plans for the Adult CF service at the RAH.
- In 2018 CFSA was also involved in successfully advocating for consistent Infection Prevention protocols at both the WCH and RAH. We remain committed to ensuring the highest standards of Infection



Control are in place in all services where people with CF are receiving care.

Moving into the new RAH, with new Heads of the RAH Thoracic and CF Departments, new staff, and new protocols, has produced many positives but also new challenges for our CF Adult community. For example, at present there are more adults attending the adult clinic, but less specialist care beds in the new Thoracic ward. This means that many adults are placed in nonspecialist wards for in-patient CF treatment. Rest assured that CFSA always listens carefully to your feedback, the issues that you raise, and works cooperatively with the new RAH leadership actively looking for ways to overcome these issues.

CF treatment in South Australia is statistically shown to be amongst the best in Australia. CFSA staff have developed strong personal relationships, based on mutual trust and respect, with many hospital and SA Health staff. This has been enhanced by the Partnership Agreement, started 20 years ago, that enables regular joint meetings between the WCH and RAH staff, and CFSA staff and Board members. At these meetings agenda items include future CF directions, and discussion of current issues with the aim of finding a solution.

We need to remember to thank our hospital staff for their commitment which, from my family's experience, frequently goes 'above and beyond' what could reasonably be expected. On your behalf I thank them.

CFSA staff, led by Executive Officer Julia Langrehr and strongly supported by Robyn Craig and Nicky Titchener, have continued to provide an extensive range of services for the CF Community.

CFSA provides many more 'hands on' services for its members than other State CF organisations do, and in doing so CFSA maintains a strong community relationship with its members. I strongly encourage our staff and members to continue building these relationships. I also thank them for their very strong support of us, the CF community.

As I write this report, Robyn and Nicky are retiring. During the three years that Nicky has been with CFSA, she has created close relationships with CFSA members and hospital staff. She will be missed. Robyn has worked for CFSA for 21 years. During that time, I have appreciated the depth of her knowledge of CF, her close personal relationships with the CF community and her 'never give up' attitude. Thankyou Robyn.

Your Board is one of the most cohesive groups that I have worked with. Their commitment and passion to provide better health care outcomes for those with CF, better support for CF care givers, and strong governance of the CFSA business is amongst the best I have seen during my 30 years on the CFSA Board. The working relationship between the CFSA Staff and Board is a very cohesive one and has strongly contributed to the success of CFSA this year. A major focus of the Board this year has been in the area of Governance. During the year we have updated or developed new Policies, such as Code of Conduct, Dispute/Grievance and Risk Management, to help the Board and Staff make decisions. On behalf of the CFSA community I thank our Board for their outstanding commitment to us, the CF Community.

CFSA is currently in a sound financial position and so our Association has continued to be able to provide money for member support and importantly for research (nationally, locally and for specific research projects at both the WCH and RAH). Member's ongoing support for CFSA fundraising efforts is extremely important for the survival

of our Association. I admire the new fundraising initiatives of many of our hardworking members. These activities are not just important for raising valuable funds, but also for improved public awareness and social interaction. Supporting these activities also helps remind my family and myself that we are not alone in our CF struggle, something that is a great strength to us. Thank you to everyone involved for supporting and running these events.

I especially wish to take this opportunity to thank Tim and Carolyn Donlan (Donlan Lawyers 65 Roses Ball) for their very significant support, both financially and personally, over more than 15 years. It is very unusual for a sponsor to support a charity for so many years, and CFSA has been fortunate to have such personal commitment.

My job as President has been made so much easier by astute advice and ideas provided by our Board, particularly from Secretary Gerry Kandelaars and Vice President Stephen Gray, from our Executive Officer Julia Langrehr, and from the many CFSA members that I have met during the past year. After 30 years on the board, including 2 stints as President, I will be stepping down from this in May. I will continue to be involved with the Board and CFSA in areas of need in the future. My vision of CFSA has always been of a team of people helping each other to achieve one goal, 'To improve the lives of those affected by Cystic Fibrosis'. I have really enjoyed being your President this year. Thank you for your support.

Executive Officer Report

2018 was a busy year with a focus on Advocacy, Awareness and Fundraising. As well as showing a spotlight on our community fundraisers we continued our important fundraising through the 65 Roses Ball and Great Strides events.

65 Roses Month

We launched 65 Roses month with a Breakfast on the first of the month. Peter Titchener volunteered to assist us with the creation of a video sharing stories from some of our members who are living with Transplant. We showcased the video at the 65 Roses Breakfast before releasing it on social media. A number of councils lit landmarks in red including the Adelaide Oval and Michael Herbert bridges, the Adelaide, Gawler and Kadina Town Halls and the Elizabeth clock tower. Some of our members shared their personal stories with local councils and service clubs.

Fundraising

Community Fundraisers were significant contributors to our income once again this year. We are particularly grateful for the efforts of the Parker and Anderson families, Cramp and De Visser families, Mandy Lowe and Rachael Smart, Gill and Sprumont families, Claire Jackson, Gloria Lancione, Nathan Rae and Craig Delaney and Tasha Creed. We made an effort to promote and acknowledge our community supporters through social media throughout the year.

This year marked 10 years of Donlan Lawyers naming sponsorship of the 65 Roses Ball. We were also delighted to take the opportunity to celebrate with Tim and Carolyn the announcement, made only the day before the ball, that Orkambi would be listed on the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS). Sincere thanks to Donlan Lawyers for their ongoing support of CFSA and the 65 Roses Ball. I'd like to also acknowledge our other Ball sponsors who have been with us for many years, Halpin Financial Services, CPR Engineering, Coopers Brewery, Scarpantoni Wines, Lane Print and Post and

Central Audio Visual.

Advocacy

Nationally we were involved in the campaign to have Orkambi listed on the PBS. Our Campaign included writing letters, sending photos, social media posts and a protest march which was well attended by over 50 parents, friends, siblings and grandparents of people who are living with CF. Channel 9 met us in Victoria Square and our story appeared on the Channel 9 news.

Locally we continued our lobbying to have the CF and Transplant Clinics relocated to the Royal Adelaide Hospital from the Chest Clinic on North Terrace. We were encouraged by the commitment in late May of the Government to make this a reality and relieved when the clinics opened in the new RAH mid-December.

We were pleased that our long advocacy for a consistent, evidence based Infection Control protocol to be implemented in the RAH was successful with the implementation of an Organisational Wide Instruction in September.

Awareness

This year CFSA collaborated with Donate Life to hold an event to launch Donate Life Week. We shared our Transplant recipient video and CFSA Ambassador Kyle Collis spoke to guests at the event hosted by William Buck. Thanks to James Northcote for facilitating the support from William Buck

Services

CFSA membership in 2018 was up slightly on 2017 figures to 178 family and individual members. This number represents about 50% of the population of people in SA living with CF. Of these members, 69% of Adult Members and 95% of Family Members received at least one practical service from CFSA. 84 members received new equipment or parts with a total value of \$22,700 and 42 members received a fitness

subsidy with a total value of \$15,600. We continue to monitor our services against the needs of members, balanced with the need to maintain a sustainable business.

Surveys

In March CFSA conducted a Members Survey with the intention of conducting a whole of membership survey on an annual basis. There were 61 responses to the survey, respondents were: Parents 45.9%, Adults living with CF 27.87%, Partner/Spouse or Sibling 3.28%, Supporter of CFSA 4.92% and other 18.03% - other included grandparents, friends & aunts or uncles. Responses about CFSA engagement and services reflected positively on the services we currently provide and feedback about the survey will assist in the development of the 2019 Annual Member Survey. Feedback about the care from both the WCH and RAH CF teams was shared with the CF teams. Members are regularly encouraged to share their experiences or concerns with CFSA through myself or my team.

Awards

Congratulations to CFSA Ambassador Dimity Bullen-Nicolas who was a finalist in the Wide World of Sports category in the Channel 9 Young Achievers awards. CFSA member and founder of The Carers Place, Cassie Day, was a semi-finalist in the 'Leadership in Innovation in Health', and a finalist in the 'Carer Achievement' categories in the Australian Community Achievement Awards. CFSA was pleased to have nominated them both and thank them for the ongoing commitment they have in supporting the CF Community.

Patrons and Ambassadors

We acknowledge the continuing support from our Patrons Mrs Lan Le and Kate Collins. Mrs Le hosted our first memorial event for bereaved families, addressing our guests and warmly welcoming us to her home. Kate Collins did a beautiful job as the MC of the 65 Roses Ball,

adding a special element to the night. We also thank

our Ambassadors Callum Ferguson, Kyle Collis and Dimity Bullen-

Nicholas. Callum and Dimity appeared together on the video to launch Dimity's March to May Marathon and Kyle raised funds and awareness of CF and Organ Donation through his courageous participation in the OCR 24 Hour Endurance Obstacle Race in June.

Volunteers

We continue to be well supported by committed volunteers, without whom, the work we do would simply not happen. I'd like to acknowledge the following people in particular. The Great Strides Strathalbyn and Largs Bay committees delivered excellent events again this year. The ongoing support of Jessica Lambert and Jessica De Ionno as co-chairs of the 65 Roses Ball committee was sincerely appreciated, along with their committee of Emma Northcote, Luke White and Ashlea Malcolm, they produced another outstanding event in 2018. I'd also like to acknowledge Glenys Kandelaars who has represented CFSA at numerous events in a public speaking, awareness and fundraising capacity.

David Messner continued to volunteer on a regular weekly basis and was appointed in Mid-December to the new role of Communications and Community Support Officer. Erica Handley continued in her role as editor of the Rose Report, providing very valuable support.

The CFSA Board continue to provide support through their important role of governance and oversight of the association. In addition to their attendance at Board meetings the following Board Members have provided additional support in 2018. Treasurer's Report

For the year ended 31 December 2018

On behalf of the Board of Cystic Fibrosis South Australia Incorporated ("CFSA"), I present the financial statements of CFSA and the Vera Lane Memorial Trust for the year ended 31 December 2018.

As expected, CFSA had a challenging year in 2018 with a loss of (\$112,252) recorded (2017: \$3,357). The balance of accumulated profits in the organisation are now \$424,708.

Gross income decreased by \$41,038 from \$454,183 to \$413,145. The Total Cost of Goods sold (costs directly attributed to Gross Income) decreased by \$28,987 to \$237,385 (2017 : \$266,372) which is expected given the reduction of income. Therefore, the Gross Operating Profit has decreased to \$175,760 (2017 : \$187,810).

This is mainly attributable to decreased numbers attending the Donlan Lawyers 65 Roses Ball and decreased direct support for member equipment and transplant subsidy but has been offset by a healthy increase in community donations.

Total overhead expenditure was around budget at \$223,512 (2017 : \$232,733). These costs are the fixed costs of salaries and wages as well as the running costs associated with the office.

An Operating loss was estimated during the Budget process for 2018 if the level donations of donations was not maintained. Previously CFSA has been the recipient of donations specifically for member support. These funds have now run out and no replacement funding has been sourced. The cost of member support was \$88,584 (2017: \$89,598).

In line with the Board's Research Strategy, funds have been granted to various research recipients. In addition to the strategy, the Board approved a research grant of \$60,000 to specific airway bacterial research being carried out by the University of Adelaide.

Despite the lower profit this year, members can be assured that CFSA is in a strong financial position. Cash balances are around \$86k lower than the same time last year which reflects the higher research contribution and lower income as mentioned previously. In addition, The Vera Lane and Jean Dunlop Trusts were bequeathed to support both research and services provided by the Association.

The challenge for CFSA will be to see if it is possible to increase/improve on donations from the wider community, both membership and corporate, in order to fund ongoing support and services.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Australian Charities and Not-for-profit Commission Act 2012. The committee has determined that the Association is not a reporting entity. The entity is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs. They do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

Income Tax

The Association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the entity and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, have been satisfied.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST) where applicable.

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. The cost of manufactured inventories includes direct materials, direct labour and an appropriate proportion of variable and fixed overhead expenses.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST receivable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all property, plant and equipment is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the Association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Impairment of Financial Assets

At each reporting date, the Company assesses whether there is objective evidence that a financial instrument has been impaired. In the case of available-for-sale financial instruments, a significant or prolonged decline in the value of the instrument is considered to determine whether impairment has arisen. Impairment losses are recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

The carrying amount of financial assets including uncollectible trade receivables is reduced by the impairment loss through the use of an allowance account. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited against the allowance account. Changes in the carrying amount of the allowance account are recognised in profit or loss.

With the exception of available-for-sale equity instruments, if, in a subsequent period, the amount of the impairment loss decreases and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, the previously recognised impairment loss is reversed through profit or loss to the extent the carrying amount of the investment at the date the impairment is reversed does not exceed what the amortised cost would have been had the impairment not been recognised.

In respect of available-for-sale equity instruments, any subsequent increase in fair value after an impairment loss is recognised directly in the financial assets reserve in other comprehensive income.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

Employee Provisions

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits expected to be settled within one year together with beneficts arising from salaries and wages, annual leave and long service leave which will be settled after one year have been measure at their normal amount. Other employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits.

Contributions are made by the Association to an employee supoerannuation fund and are changed as expenses when incurred.

NOTE 1 - STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The trustees have prepared the financial statements of the trust on the basis that the trust is a non-reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements. Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised when the significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods have passed to the buyer, usually on delivery of the goods. Revenue from the provision of services is recognised at the time of issue of the notice.

Rental income arising from operating leases on investment properties is recognised as income upon receipt.

Interest income is mainly on interest-bearing cash and cash equivalent balances. Interest income is recognised upon receipt.

Dividend revenue is recognised when the dividend has been paid or, in the case of dividend reinvestment schemes, credited to the owner.

Comparative figures

When required, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of twelve months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown with borrowings in current liabilities on the Balance Sheet.

Financial Assets

Investments in financial assets are initially recognised at cost, which included transaction costs, and are subsequently measured at fair value, which is equivalent to their market value bid price at the end of the reporting period. Movements in fair value are recognised through and equity
